Subject: SB 501 (Allen): Household Hazardous Waste Producer Responsibility Act SUPPORT

Dear Chair Umberg,

We, the undersigned, write to express our **strong support for SB 501 (Allen)**, as amended April 7, 2025, which will establish Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) for Household Hazardous Waste (HHW).

HHW is a broad category of many common products used daily by consumers that contain hazardous materials. HHW requires special handling and disposal, as it is illegal to dispose of HHW in the garbage, down storm drains, or onto the ground. When illegally or improperly disposed of, chemicals in HHW can be released into the environment and contaminate our air, water, and food supply. Maybe most importantly, improperly disposed HHW exposes recycling and waste workers to avoidable dangers and increases insurance costs to operators. Waste management collection is the fourth deadliest job in the country based on data from the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics

California's HHW collection and management system is underfunded, inconvenient, and does not collect a majority of what is generated. According to <u>California's Commission on Recycling</u> <u>Markets and Curbside Recycling</u> (Commission), which was comprised of 16 experts representing materials management companies, local governments, unions, and NGOs, "our current system for managing HHW is both a significant public expense, and also an expensive failure." The first policy recommendation the Commission unanimously approved was to "pass an EPR Framework bill delegating to either CalEPA, CalRecycle and/or DTSC the authority to develop criteria and identify toxic products each year to be transitioned to EPR programs until such a time that no toxic or hazardous products are costing local governments money to manage."

The legislature has embraced the goal of achieving a Circular Economy and already passed laws that address some HHW products including mercury thermostats, paint, medications and needles, and batteries. California can continue to pass legislation for one product at a time or pass SB 501 which would cover some of the most dangerous and costly HHW not already under a program, with mechanisms for the Department of Toxic Substances Control to add problematic HHW products as they arise.

For these reasons, we **strongly support SB 501** and respectfully urge your Aye vote when it is heard in the Senate Judiciary Committee.
