Community Health Assessment Overview

- Completed in December 2023
- Framework chosen = BARHII which is a model that looks at health inequities in a community
- Review of 90 local health indicators measuring
 - Social conditions
 - Economic conditions
 - Living Conditions
 - Risk Behaviors
 - Morbidity and Mortality measures

Health Assessment Findings

- Domain: Social/economic/governance/institutional conditions
 - High rates of poverty lower per capita income
 - Lower rates of post secondary education
 - Less access to healthcare with fewer physicians/dentists/mental health providers per population
- Living Conditions
 - Limited park access
 - High risk of heat and wildfire impacts
 - High Food insecurity
- Coping and risk behavior and conditions
 - High teen birth rate
 - High rates of smoking and physical inactivity
- Health Outcomes
 - High rates of cancer, blood pressure, diabetes and obesity
 - Higher rate of disability
 - Higher rate of premature death

Health Assessment Priority Areas of Focus

• Identified 5 priority areas impacting health

- Economic
- Education
- Healthcare Access
- Health Behaviors
- Transportation

Qualitative Data Gathering

- Mobilizing Action through Planning and Partnerships (MAPP)-NACCHO
- Focus Groups
- Community Wide Survey
- Subject Matter Expert/Key Informant Interviews

Triangulation of Data

• Process:

- Review qualitative Results from the MAPP
- Review of County/City/non-profit strategic plans
- Issue statements developed from public input/perception

• Results:

- Key Issue statements were developed for 5 key areas (hand out)
 - Access To Healthcare
 - Mental Health Services
 - Food Access
 - Homelessness and Housing Insecurity
 - Transportation

Access to Healthcare

- Issue: Tehama county residents experience several challenges accessing healthcare services. Some of challenges described included:
 - Out of pocket costs
 - Long waitlists
 - Hours of operation conflict with work schedules
 - Lack of culturally and linguistically sensitive providers
 - Inaccessibility of specialists
- Root Causes and Contributing Factors: Several that could be categorized
 - Workforce
 - Cultural
 - Environment/Infrastructure
 - Institutional

Mental Health Services

- Issue: Insufficient mental health and substance use disorder prevention and treatment services within Tehama County. There are 570 residents for every one mental health provider in the county compared to 240:1 in California overall.
- Root Causes and Contributing Factors:
 - Lack of diverse treatment facilities including rehab centers, inpatient, and crisis facilities
 - Eligibility and insurance coverage
 - Genetics
 - Self Medication
 - Justice involvement leading to delays or inadequate treatment

Food Access

- Issue: Only one in three Tehama County residents have adequate access to a supermarket, living within a half a mile (for urban areas) or a mile (for rural areas) of a grocery story.
- Root Causes and Contributing Factors:
 - Low wages (Quote from one of our interviews: "I've had people who are juggling between do I fix this or do I eat?"
 - Unemployment
 - Limited transportation
 - Price and availability of food
 - Silos between food serving charitable organizations
 - Social isolation

Homelessness and Housing Insecurity

- Issue: Tehama county residents experience homelessness, at a rate of 53.2 per 10,000 population, significantly higher than the comparable California rate of 38.2 per 10,000. There is a need for a wider range of housing choices and opportunities, including transistional housing, low income housing, and moderate income housing that can provide opportunities for upward mobility.
- Root Causes and Contributing Factors:
 - Economic factors-limited job opportunities, lower wages and lack of economic diversification
 - Housing shortages
 - Aging housing infrastructure
 - Multigenerational poverty
 - Mental Health
 - Costs associated with regulations attached to building new units

Transportation

- Issue: Transportation issues including lack of vehicle access, inadequate infrastructure, long distances, and lengthy times to reach needed services were identified as concerns. According to the ACS, 7% of Tehama county households lack access to a vehicle and 3% of residents 16 years and older use active commuting to travel to work compared to 9% of Ca. A safer, more connected active transportation network will increase access to goods and services and should consider access to regional transit connections particularly for disadvantages and remote populations.
- Root Causes and Contributing Factors:
 - Lack of connecting infrastructure (trails, bike paths)
 - Lack of available routes
 - Lack of knowledge of existing services
 - Lack of vehicle access
 - Disability access challenges

Current Status

- Issue statements have been reviewed by the Committee
- Voted on top 2 issues to include in this CHIP
 - Access to Care
 - Mental Health Services
- Identified draft Goals, Objectives and Strategies for those issues
- Draft plan is in development
- Committee will review draft early in the new year

Closing Comments

- Community Health Improvement Plan = Collective Impact
- Progress is already happening:
 - Developing new local and regional partnerships with organizations who don't deliver health directly but their work impacts health (transportation, economic, education, etc.)
 - Working with UC Davis and UCCE to explore root causes of Tehama's high Cancer Rates and having conversations with local providers
 - Working with CSU and Butte Glenn Medical Society to look at having up and coming psychiatric and family medicine residents do rotations within Tehama County
